11th PRESIDENT



The University of Saskatchewan community is excited and proud to celebrate the installation of its 11th president and vice-chancellor, Peter Stoicheff.

Peter holds an undergraduate degree in English and history from Queen's University (1978) and a PhD in literature from the University of Toronto (1983). He joined the University of Saskatchewan's English department as a faculty member in 1986. From 2005-2010, he was vice-dean of humanities and fine arts in the College of Arts and Science, and has served as dean of the College of Arts and Science since 2011. The hallmark of his deanship was a focus on bringing together in a collaborative structure the sciences, social sciences, humanities and fine arts.

An active scholar throughout his career, he is highly regarded internationally for his work on modern literature, and his exploration of the history of the book and its future in a digital age. Peter has served in national and provincial leadership roles

in research, scholarly and artistic work, including on the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) national committee and the SSHRC doctoral committee. He oversaw the creation of the U of S Digital Research Centre and the Interdisciplinary Centre for Culture and Creativity. He received the university's Graduate Supervisor Award in 2002.

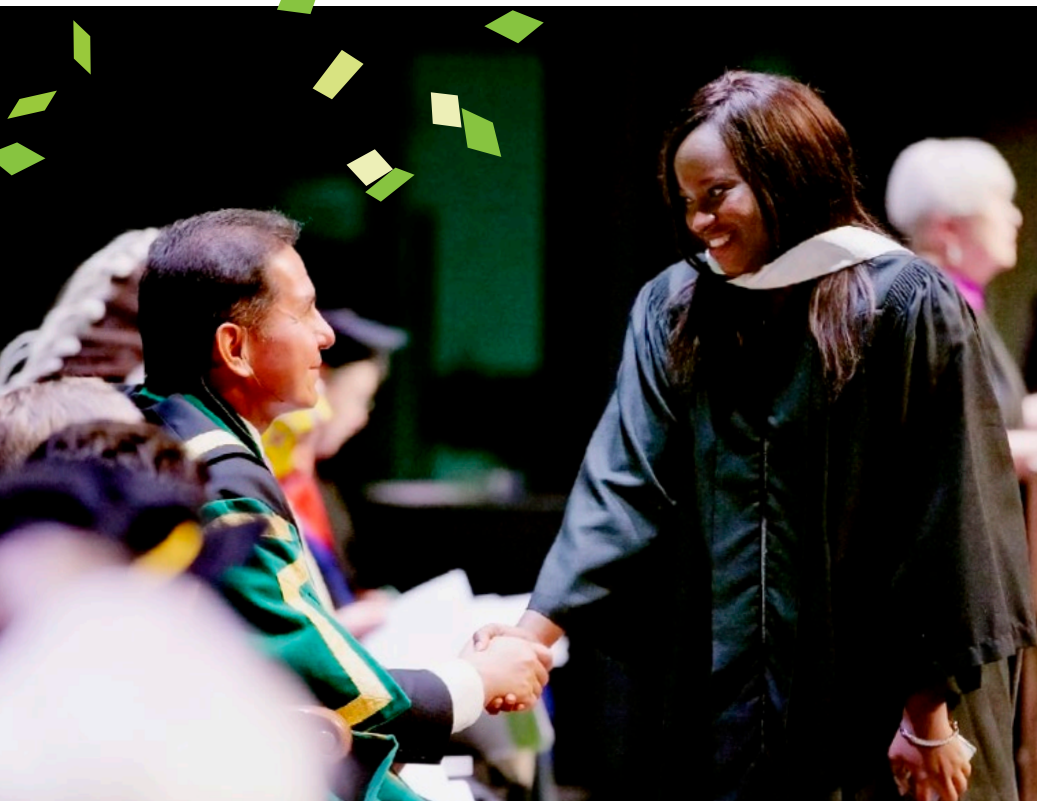
A classical guitarist and composer, Peter has produced two acoustic guitar CDs, Cantos I and Ethereal Steel.

Peter and his wife Kathryn Warden, director of research profile and impact at the University of Saskatchewan, are long-time residents of Saskatoon and have two children, Alixandra and Christopher.



OUR CEREMONY

The convocation ceremony is a calling together of the new graduates of the University of Saskatchewan, symbolizing the historical practice of calling together all former graduates. In current times, the major functions of convocation are the election of representatives to university governing bodies and the admission of candidates to degrees. The chancellor, appointed by senate as the chair of convocation, is the highest official and spokesperson of the university.



The convocation ceremony marks the transition from the role of student to the holder of a degree with its accompanying rights and privileges.

The ceremony, solemnized in the presence of the university community and family and friends of the graduands, consists of three parts: a procession marking the leaving of the old status and entering the new; the president's statement to the graduands, the secretary's petition and the chancellor's consent for their admission; followed by individual presentation by a university orator and admission by the chancellor to the degrees to which they are entitled.

As graduates are admitted to their degrees, a graduation hood, which has a colour symbolizing a particular degree, is placed over each graduate's head.

ENTRANCE

Graduands in their academic dress march in procession into the ceremony in the following order: graduands in the order in which their degrees are to be conferred; faculty; board of governors; senate; guests of honour; the president; the chancellor; the lieutenant governor. When the members of convocation reach their places they remain standing during the Vice-Regal Salute, the singing of "O Canada" and the invocation.

ORDER OF THE CEREMONY

The first business is the conferring of honorary degrees, followed by convocation address, president's statement to the graduands, the conferring of degrees and the presentation of awards. The meeting is closed by the chancellor rising and leading the procession in the reverse order out of the hall.

THE PETITION

The university secretary on behalf of all the candidates, addresses the chancellor and senate in the following words:

"Eminent Chancellor, Mr. President, members of the University Senate and Board, I present to you the petition of the Council of this university that the candidates to be named, having fulfilled all the requirements of the bylaws, may, with your permission, be admitted to the degrees and certificates to which they are entitled".



THE ADMISSION

The chancellor then addresses the candidates:

"By virtue of the authority vested in me by the legislature of this province, and with the consent of the Council of this university, I consent to admit you to the degrees and certificates to which you are entitled and to invest you with all the powers, rights and privileges pertaining thereto."

THE PRESENTATION

The university orator approaches the chancellor from the left and presents the candidates:

"Eminent Chancellor, on behalf of the faculty of _____, I present to you these scholars and ask that you will confer on them the degree of _____."

Each candidate then comes forward and the degree hood is placed on his or her shoulders. As the orator speaks the candidate's name in full, the candidate moves forward in front of the chancellor. Then the chancellor says, **"I admit you"**. Hereupon the candidate passes to the chancellor's right, is greeted by the dean of the faculty, or designate, and receives the degree parchment.

DEGREES IN ABSENTIA

In such cases, the university secretary says:

"Eminent Chancellor, in the name of the faculties, I ask you to grant the degrees and certificates, in absentia, to those students who have met the requirements to graduate, but were not able to be present today."

ACADEMIC DRESS

Academic dress lends an element of colourful pageantry to the convocation proceedings. This traditional clothing—worn on a daily basis at universities in earlier times—is now reserved for ceremonial functions.

At the University of Saskatchewan, the following academic dress is adopted for all appropriate occasions: The gown resembles a long cape with full sleeve cut to elbow and terminating in a point for the bachelor's degree; with long sleeve and a semi-circular cut at the bottom for the master's degree; and with round open sleeves for the doctor's degree. The material is black broadcloth for the bachelor's, master's and doctor's degrees. The doctoral gown incorporates green and gold on the front and sleeve panels.

The hoods for the bachelor's and master's degrees are of black broadcloth. The master's and doctor's hoods have a lining and the bachelor's an edging (and in some cases, a lining) of a color distinctive of the character of the degree.

PhD hoods have a green satin lining with gold trim and the honorary degree hoods feature a white satin trim. A velvet Beefeater style hat with a green, gold and white tassel is also part of the doctoral dress.

ABORIGINAL CULTURE

At the U of S, we have one of the highest populations of Aboriginal students among Canadian post-secondary institutions. As indicated in our Third Integrated Plan, one of our most influential documents, it is important to us to include Indigenous knowledge and experience into our daily practices, curriculum and celebrations. At convocation, one of our most important celebrations, we display the Treaty No. 6 flag, Métis flag and sing an honour song.



GRADUATION POWWOW

The University of Saskatchewan Graduation Powwow is a celebration of the accomplishments of Aboriginal Students. The Graduation powwow highlights First Nation, Métis and Inuit students with song, dance and honoring the commitment of everyone involved in the post-secondary experience. We are proud to host such an event that gives Aboriginal people an opportunity to show case culture and academics.

TREATY FLAG

Represented on the Treaty No. 6 flag are the signatories of the treaty—the First Nations and the Queen's representative. The signatories stand in front of a Treaty medal with the Union Jack in the background. First Nations Veterans adopted this flag and often bring it to powwows to show respect and to remind the younger generations that treaties were signed under this flag.

MÉTIS FLAG

The Métis flag has been a symbol for the Métis Nation since as early as 1816. The infinity is a representation of the joining of two cultures—forever intertwined, a people forever. The flag is nationally recognized by the Métis Nation across Canada.

HONOUR SONG

These are special songs to demonstrate respect for an individual or group in recognition of their accomplishments such as a return from military service or other events. In some families, individuals have their own song, which is sung for them when they are being honoured.





UNIVERSITY ORATORS

Our 12 orators hail from all parts of campus and perform a wide range of roles throughout the university, but all are gifted with resonant voices, pronunciation skills and share a fine attention to detail.

The post of university orator can be traced back hundreds of years to universities in the United Kingdom such as Oxford and Cambridge. Traditionally orators served as the official voice of the university, composing letters, giving speeches in Latin at ceremonial occasions and presenting candidates for honorary degrees.

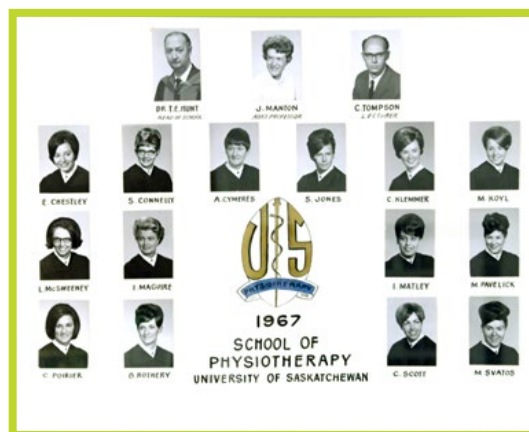

CELEBRATE 50 YEARS

THE FIRST CLASS OF PHYSICAL THERAPISTS FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF SASKATCHEWAN CROSSED THE STAGE TO RECEIVE THEIR DEGREES IN 1967. DURING ITS HALF-CENTURY HISTORY, THE PROGRAM HAS UNDERGONE PROGRESSIONS IN CURRICULUM AND EVOLVED FROM A DIPLOMA PROGRAM TO ITS CURRENT MODEL AS A MASTER'S PROGRAM.



In the fall term of 1965, a diploma program in physical therapy was established at the University of Saskatchewan known as the "Course in Physical Therapy". Because of a severe shortage of physical therapists in the province, the program was designed to be a short course with the expectation that it would quickly expand into a degree program.

In the fall of 1973, the diploma program was extended to three years, and an optional fourth year baccalaureate degree in physical therapy was established (B.P.T.). The next major change in the physical therapy program occurred in 1976 with the establishment of a School of Physical Therapy, within the College of Medicine.

In 1981, a four year baccalaureate degree in science in physical therapy, B.Sc.(P.T.) was established as the entry to practice professional degree. The diploma and B.P.T. programs were discontinued over this period.

In 2007 the Master of Physical Therapy program was established and the number of students admitted to the program increased from 30 to 40 per year. Since establishment the program has held full accreditation. A strong partnership with the community has led to excellent recruitment and retention of our high quality graduates; approximately 80% of Physical Therapists in the province received their education at the University of Saskatchewan.

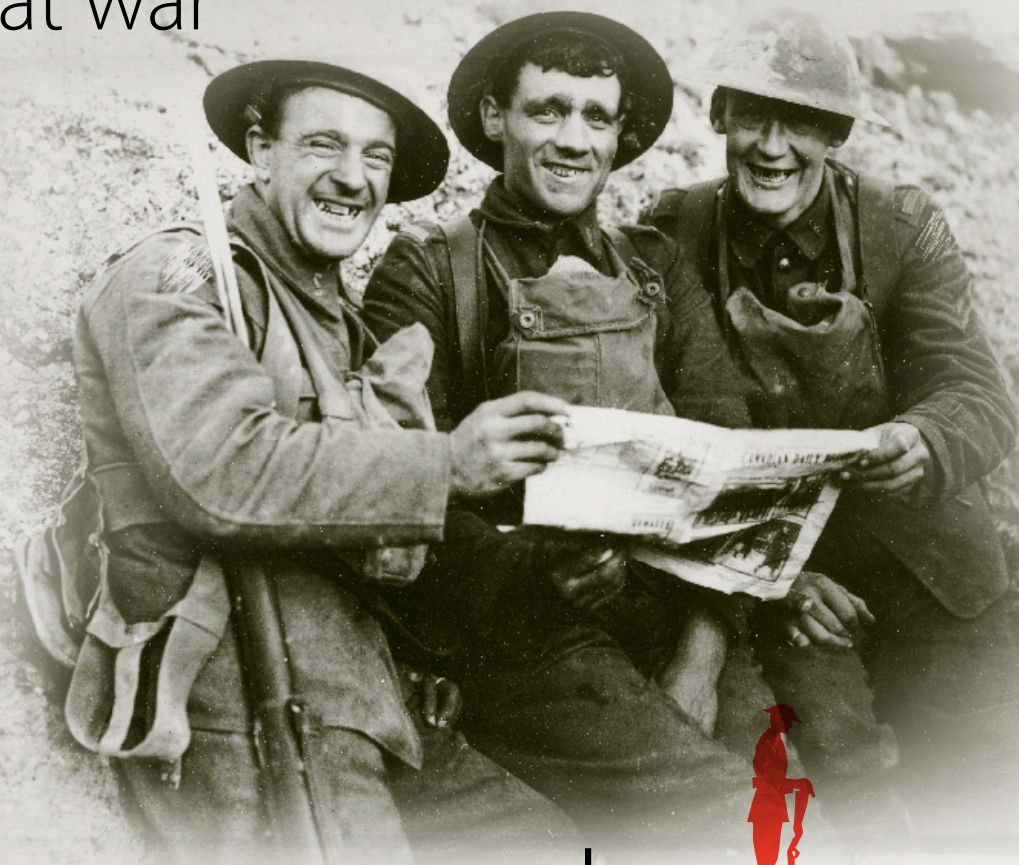
Life, and death, honour, and liberty: our University at war

As the Great War opened in August 1914 the University of Saskatchewan was not yet seven years old with just three graduating classes totalling less than fifty earned degrees. Under the leadership of President Walter Murray, the university at the time had its sights set on growth and expansion. The war changed everything.

Recruitment and beyond

Within three months a recruiting program was instituted on campus and the first group of student recruits marched to the train station, bound for training in Winnipeg.

The positions of faculty and staff who enlisted were kept open and they were given half pay. An additional allowance was offered to married men. Students who enlisted were given credit for one year's work. The University also started military instruction and drill for the students and staff. The first recruitments went into University Battalions trained at McGill who went overseas as reinforcements for the Princess Pats.

Of the 345 students, faculty and staff who enlisted, 69 "passed out of the sight of man by the path of duty and self-sacrifice."

In early 1916 the idea of a Western University Battalion took root. Reginald Bateman, the university's first Professor of English and war hero, was sent back to Canada to raise a company of the 196th (Western Universities) Battalion. President Murray also played a prominent role — almost single-handedly recruiting the "Saskatchewan Company".

President Murray's war effort went beyond recruitment. It had become apparent that science and innovation would be key to victory. In late 1916 Murray joined the newly created Honorary Advisory Council for Scientific and Industrial Research of Canada. He worked at a frenetic pace in his new role directing research into areas that would benefit the war effort. His efforts did much to shape the research that would develop on campus over the next several decades.

Though only one female student actually served overseas, the University's women were indelibly affected by the war. Some took up new roles and responsibilities just as women throughout the province were donning jobs that had belonged

to their husbands and sons. In the midst of coping with new responsibilities, shortages and rationing, they also showed their support by providing comforts for their fighting brethren.

Losses felt deeply

The Great War exacted a heavy toll on the U of S. Of the 345 students, faculty and staff who enlisted, 69 "passed out of the sight of man by the path of duty and self-sacrifice". More than 100 more were wounded and 33 were awarded medals of valour. The School of Engineering closed its doors for the 1916-1917 session when the faculty and students enlisted en masse.

Honouring service and sacrifice

As early as March 1916, the University of Saskatchewan Board of Governors decided to create a Roll of Honour (pictured above) by having the names of everyone connected with the University who had enlisted inscribed on the 'ribbons' in the corridors of the Peter MacKinnon Building.

The university's Memorial Gates were erected in 1927-28 in memory of the students and faculty who perished in the Great War. Designed by the original University architect, David R. Brown, the gates have been the site of Remembrance Day services each year since their dedication in 1928.

A stone tablet, positioned between the bronze gates, bears the inscription: These are they who went forth from this University to the Great War and gave their lives that we might live in freedom.

A memorial stone and plaque honouring the 46th Canadian Infantry Battalion (South Saskatchewan), CEF, was dedicated on November 11, 1933. It rests under a tree on the northeast corner of the Bowl.

Bob Xiaoping Xu (MA'92) is a College of Arts and Science Alumni of Influence for 2015. He is a philanthropist, mentor, business innovator and one of China's most prominent angel investors. He is co-founder of the New Oriental Education & Technology group, the largest provider of private education in China. He established the ZhenFund that has invested in more than 150 start-ups. In 2004, Forbes magazine listed him as one of China's Top 100 Celebrities.



Piya Chattopadhyay (BA'95) is an award-winning broadcast journalist. She has travelled the world covering national and international stories in countries including Sri Lanka, India and Afghanistan. She was the Middle East correspondent for Fox News Radio. Since 2009, she has been a host for CBC Radio, hosting a variety of programs including The Current, Q and The World at Six. She is a College of Arts and Science Alumni of Influence for 2015.



Craig Reynolds (BComm'98, MPAcc'99) is the president and CEO of the Saskatchewan Roughriders. As senior vice-president and chief financial officer, he was a member of the 2013 Grey Cup executive committee and played a lead role in the Grey Cup Legacy Project resulting in the expansion of the current Mosaic Stadium. He has led the team's involvement in the new Mosaic Stadium and developed the capital campaign to support the organization's financial commitment to the new stadium.

BRIAN GABLE



Brian Gable was born in Saskatoon in 1949. For the first ten years of his life he grew up on a farm near Rosthern where, in that venerable prairie tradition, he attended a one-room school. In 1960 his family moved to Saskatoon, at that time a city of just under a hundred thousand citizens, but for a ten-year-old farm boy, a teeming urban metropolis.

After attending Holliston School and Walter Murray Collegiate, Mr. Gable was accepted in 1965 into the Pre-Architecture program in the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Saskatchewan. Calculus and its complexities came between Mr. Gable and the practice of architecture. However, the Fine Arts classes of painting, design, drawing, and English, which were part of the Pre-Architecture curriculum, spoke strongly to him and Mr. Gable became a Fine Arts major and an English minor. It was during a first-year English survey class that a fellow student, after noting Mr. Gable's endless doodlings in the margins of his notes, mentioned that the Sheaf was looking for a cartoonist. Over the next three years he submitted cartoons to the student paper and was able to take his first tentative steps in learning about the craft of satire.

In 1971, having graduated with a BA from the U of S, Mr. Gable moved to Toronto and enrolled in the College of Education at the University

of Toronto. Graduating with a B.Ed. in 1971, he taught secondary school art in Brockville, Ontario, for the next nine years. It was during this period in Brockville that Mr. Gable took up his cartoonist's pen once more and began freelancing editorial cartoons for the local paper, the *Brockville Recorder and Times*.

In 1980 Mr. Gable was hired by the *Regina Leader Post* as an editorial cartoonist and he remained with that paper until 1987, when he accepted a position as editorial cartoonist for the *Globe and Mail*, a position that he holds at present.

Mr. Gable's work has been published in numerous publications including the *New York Times*, the *International Herald Tribune*, *Time Magazine*, the *Guardian*, *Prospect Magazine* and numerous other publications. He has been nominated for a National Newspaper Award fifteen times and has won the award six times.

GERALD FINLEY



Grammy award-winning bass-baritone Gerald Finley is a leading singer and dramatic interpreter of his generation, with acclaimed performances at the world's major opera and concert venues and award-winning recordings on CD and DVD in a wide variety of repertoire. Mr. Finley's career is devoted to the wide range of classical vocal art, encompassing opera, choral, orchestral and song, collaborating with the greatest orchestras and conductors of our time.

Mr. Finley was born in Montreal, began singing in Ottawa, and completed his musical studies in the UK at the Royal College of Music in London, and King's College, Cambridge. He made his debut in the chorus of the Glyndebourne Festival in the UK, moving on to the main baritone roles of Mozart; his Don Giovanni, Figaro and Count have since been heard on DVD, and live in the major opera houses of the world.

In recent years, his successful focus has been in the Wagner and Verdi repertoire: as Hans Sachs at the Glyndebourne Festival, as Amfortas in Parsifal at Royal Opera Covent Garden, Iago in Otello on CD and as Falstaff at the Canadian Opera. He has excelled in creating leading roles, most notably J. Robert Oppenheimer in John Adams' *Doctor Atomic*, and Jaufré Rudel in Kaija Saariaho's *L'amour de loin*.

In 2012, his CD *Arias in English* received the Canadian Juno Award in Vocal Performance and the DVD release of *Doctor Atomic* was awarded the Grammy for Best Opera Recording.

Modern day composers have written extensively for Mr. Finley in concert repertoire and include Peter Lieberson, Mark Anthony Turnage, and Einojuhani Rautavaara.

As a celebrated song recitalist, Mr. Finley works regularly with pianist Julius Drake. His many solo recital CD releases have been devoted to songs of Barber, Britten, Ives, Ravel, Liszt, and Schubert and Schumann song cycles. He has won an unprecedented three Gramophone Awards in the Solo Vocal category. The release of Schubert's *Winterreise* was awarded the 2015 Juno Award.

He is a Fellow and Visiting Professor at the Royal College of Music and gives celebrated masterclasses throughout the world, most recently at the Juilliard School of Music in New York and the Schulich School at McGill University.

Mr. Finley was honoured by Opera Canada with a Ruby Award in 2012. In 2014, Mr. Finley climbed Kilimanjaro for the charity Help Musicians UK raising \$10000 and was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada.

MARIE LOVROD



In undertaking her research on youth in care, and the gendered effects of economic policies and practices related to paid and unpaid labour, Dr. Marie Lovrod's primary objective is engaging relevant local, regional, national and international communities in all facets of her research, teaching, and outreach efforts. As professor of Women's and Gender studies and English, Dr. Lovrod documents autobiographic accounts of traumatic experiences, expressed through writing and other creative forms of expression in order to better understand childhood and youth trauma, and the effects of domestic

and state violence. Working with vulnerable young people requires great trust, something Dr. Lovrod has earned by building sensitive, lasting relationships with many Saskatchewan community organizations.

One of Dr. Lovrod's research projects led to the establishment of a housing project and community hotline for young people facing violence. This, in turn, led to a valuable partnership with the Saskatchewan Youth in Care and Custody Network (SYICCN) and further examination of how peer-supported training might improve outcomes for young adults formerly in government care and transitioning to independence. A series of projects, organized in part by young people, allowed participants to express their experiences through the traditional methods of focus groups and surveys, but also via more participant-centred forms of expression including photo-voicing, scrapbooking, and oral history.

Through the Office of Engagement and Outreach at Station 20 West, Dr. Lovrod contributes to the work of several community-based organizations, including

The Saskatoon Mothers' Centre, Next UP and International Women of Saskatoon. Beyond Saskatchewan, Dr. Lovrod has established a collaborative research project between the University of Saskatchewan and Lanzhou University in China to support that country's realization of the increasing importance of gender equity through the development of graduate training in gender studies. Nationally recognized for her work, Dr. Lovrod currently serves as president of Woman's and Gender Studies et Recherches Féministes of the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women, and is also often sought out by local media as an expert in her field.

For conducting meaningful community-based scholarship that contributes greatly to a wider body of knowledge in Women's and Gender studies, and provides enriching student learning experiences, Dr. Lovrod enhances the University of Saskatchewan's reputation locally, nationally, and internationally. She is a very deserving recipient of the 2015 Award for Distinction in Community-Engaged Teaching and Scholarship.

KEITH WILLOUGHBY



Keith Willoughby, Associate Professor at the Department of Finance and Management Science and Associate Dean at the Edwards School of Business, is recognised as a Master Teacher at the University of Saskatchewan for his unwavering commitment to student learning and innovations in teaching.

With his deep-rooted passion for teaching and a strategy that focuses on pedagogical innovation, connection to students, and real-world applications, Dr. Willoughby has shown momentous innovations in curriculum design and delivery that has positively impacted

student learning and the reputation of the Operations Management (OM) major at the U of S. His colleagues enthusiastically remark that Dr. Willoughby's impactful and innovative teaching is instrumental in transforming both students' perception of and enrollment in the OM major. His students correspondingly speak of his contribution in turning a once under-enrolled major into a field of study they find dynamic, exciting, and worth pursuing as a career.

Students, colleagues at the department, business community, media and local government leaders speak with pride about the positive impact of Dr. Willoughby's innovative approaches to teaching and his scholarship. He believes that "Education cannot be allowed to stagnate", accordingly in his courses innovation is always in motion. He is masterful at connecting real-world events and experiences to learning in the classroom. His students have the opportunity to learn in the field, which allows them to step into their careers with a set of skills honed by practice and close mentorship.

Dr. Willoughby's innovative and impactful

teaching was recognized by the MBA Professor of the Year Award (2015), Provosts College Award (2013) and USSU Teaching Excellence Award (2010). Moreover, the impact of his class assignments are felt in the community. For example, an assignment where his student group acted as consultants in a process improvement project at Saskatoon Food Bank, won award for the "Most Innovative Operations Management" project at a 2015 SCOPE event.

As a scholar-teacher, Dr. Willoughby has significantly contributed to academia, industry and education. His research is cited in academic outlets, he has contributed by publishing and acting as associated editor for professional journals such as *ITE Journal*, and his scholarship is pragmatic. For example, one of his collaborative studies helped improve emergency department patient flow at Saskatoon's Royal University Hospital.

Overall, Dr. Willoughby is a true Master Teacher who remains continuously innovative, celebrates student success, cherishes student learning, and aims at a long-lasting impact of his scholarship on students and the community.

MAUREEN G. REED



Dr. Maureen Reed, professor and assistant director of the School of Environment and Sustainability (SENS), focuses her research on 'sustainability-in-action' with a particular interest in governance models that bring together local practitioners/communities, private sector and public sector representatives to generate innovations for sustainable, equitable, and transformative change. Her research has focused on UNESCO biosphere reserves, model forests and community forests as sites where local people seek to advance

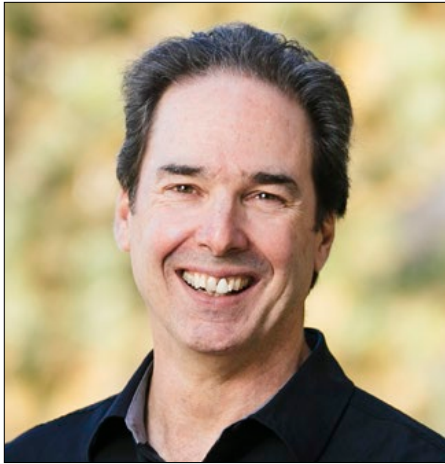
sustainable environments, livelihoods and social systems. She has conducted significant work related to gender and forestry and is now turning her attention to how gender relations affect adaptation of rural communities to climate change. She was integral to the creation of SENS and the interdisciplinary graduate programs it now offers. At SENS, she helped cultivate an interdisciplinary community of professors and students who work collaboratively to produce research that addresses environmental and sustainability challenges faced by contemporary society.

In addition to being a respected researcher and collaborator, Dr. Reed is a dedicated mentor sought-after by students for advice and guidance. Over her career, she has directly supervised 35 graduate students and has served on almost 80 graduate student committees. She is a passionate teacher and dedicates an enormous amount of time and effort to ensuring the success of her graduate students. As a supervisor, Dr. Reed seeks to instill in a new generation the values of meaningful and equitable scholarship. This

work involves role modeling, facilitating activities, seeking new opportunities, maintaining relationships with academic and community partners and networking. She challenges students to think differently and to push past their comfort zones, while tailoring strategies to their changing needs and professional development. It also involves nurturing excellence by encouraging and supporting their best efforts. Dr. Reed has positively influenced the academic and professional growth of her students and motivates them to reach high standards of excellence.

Dr. Reed considers her students to be among her most valued colleagues—colleagues-in-training who have important contributions to make and expertise to offer. She treats them with the utmost respect and they flourish under her supervision. Her graduates have taken up PhD and academic appointments in other universities, worked as senior civil servants in municipal, provincial and federal governments, and have become leaders in civil society organizations.

JEFFREY MCDONNELL



The 2015 recipient of the J.W. George Ivany Internationalization Award is Dr. Jeffrey McDonnell, Associate Director, Global Institute for Water Security (GIWS) and Professor of Hydrology, School of Environment and Sustainability.

Dr. McDonnell strongly believes that internationalization of higher education embraces the mobility of faculty and students, educational aids, international cooperation, and curriculum internationalization. An important aspect of Dr. McDonnell's life's work has been

his engagement with young researchers. He not only believes in scientific training of highly qualified personnel (HQP) in his lab, but also focuses on mentoring and launching the research careers of his team members. Dr. McDonnell has an active HQP training program through his international shortcourses including the "Catchment Science Summer School", University of Aberdeen; a "Watershed Hydrology Masterclass", University of Arizona; a "Forest Hydrology Shortcourse", Universidad Austral de Chile; an "Advanced Isotope Hydrology for Uranium Mining Applications", Federal University of Rio de Janeiro and Instituto de Radioproteção e Dosimetria, Brazil; an "Isotope Hydrology Course" for the UN's International Atomic Energy Agency; and his "Launching an Academic Career" course at the American Geophysical Union. Dr. McDonnell is collaborating on a "Knowledge Synthesis Initiative" with the Gwenna Moss Centre for Teaching Effectiveness to synergize intellectual potential and harness research information from graduate students and postdoctoral fellows at GIWS representing 21 different countries that could lead to breakthroughs in water science.

Dr. McDonnell's philosophy is to give Canadian students international experience and to give international students Canadian experiences. His lab members represent ethnic and gender diversity and include civil engineers, soil scientists, cell biologists, geologists, geographers and geochemists. They have hailed from the UK, Germany, Malaysia, USA, Netherlands, and China. Dr. McDonnell has logged more than 100,000 miles of travel per year since 2012. He has undertaken three month research visits as Keohane Visiting Distinguished Professor at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Duke University; as Comisión Nacional de Investigación Científica y Tecnológica Visiting Professor at Universidad Austral de Chile; and as Visiting Professor at Biosphere 2 at the University of Arizona. To support his philosophy, Dr. McDonnell encourages his graduate students and postdoctoral fellows to visit at least one of his international research sites to work with an international partner institute for three to six months. He invites students, faculty and technical staff from collaborative research institutions to spend time at his own lab and at research sites in Canada.

MARGARET BROWN



Margaret (Marg) Brown is well known as “the administrative backbone” of the University of Saskatchewan’s Native Law Centre; she has, after all, been with the organization since its beginnings in 1974. She is a consistently excellent administrative assistant who demonstrates efficiency, proficiency and initiative in her work but it is her ability to build and maintain relationships that makes her such a worthy recipient of the President’s Service Award.

Many of Ms. Brown’s nominators pointed to the extraordinary bonds she has built with Aboriginal students in the College of Law and students enrolled in the eight-week Program of Legal Studies for Native People. It starts with creating a welcoming and comfortable environment for students from all parts of the country. Often anxious about a new academic environment and under pressure to meet university standards, the students find in Ms. Brown a notable warmth and an unfailing sense of humour that puts them at ease. In fact, Ms. Brown’s interest in these students follows them throughout their legal studies and beyond.

As one nominator noted, “sometimes, like a friend, she offered words of encouragement when you were down. Sometimes, like a mom, she offered a kick in the pants if that’s what was needed for a student to see their potential. Sometimes Marg fed a student if they needed it. If you were absolutely in a bind, she would watch your kids while you ran across campus. (The students) were her kids; more importantly, they are her friends.”

Ms. Brown’s relationships extend beyond students to include alumni, funding agencies, college and university personnel, government departments, Aboriginal leaders, organizations, and other communities.

Known to have high standards for accountability and for administration, Ms. Brown has worked constantly over her career to make improvements, develop new initiatives and programs, and master new skills. She has voluntarily participated in a number of courses, workshops and meetings to improve her own knowledge, and she enthusiastically takes on every challenge that emerges, generating potential practical and innovative solutions.

There have been many changes at the Native Law Centre over the course of Ms. Brown’s career there but one constant has been her dedication and commitment to its students, staff and faculty. Some say she embodies the original vision for the centre as an institution to provide support to Aboriginal students and to serve as a hub for research in Aboriginal law.

REGAN MANDRYK



The New Researcher Award is given every year to a faculty member at the University of Saskatchewan who has made outstanding contributions to his or her discipline. Regan Mandryk, associate professor in the Department of Computer Science, is the 2015 recipient of this prestigious honour.

Dr. Mandryk received her BSc in Mathematics

at the University of Winnipeg in 1997; she then completed her MSc in Kinesiology and her PhD in Computer Science at Simon Fraser University. After postdoctoral fellowships at the University of British Columbia and Dalhousie University, Dr. Mandryk joined the U of S Department of Computer Science in 2007.

Dr. Mandryk is a prolific and highly-regarded researcher in Human-Computer Interaction. She is recognized as an international leader in affective computing, an area of research that is concerned with sensing and modeling the affective and emotional state of the user and with making use of these models in the design of interactive systems. Dr. Mandryk has also made important contributions in several related areas, including computer game design for improved health, user performance modeling and interaction techniques for novel display technologies. Dr. Mandryk is a highly productive and well-published

scholar. She has published over 70 full papers since joining the U of S; these publications have consistently been placed in the most prestigious venues in her field. Her papers have been cited more than 3500 times, with 9 papers having more than 100 citations each. In addition, the broader impact of her work is reflected in the over \$1.4 million of external funding that she has been awarded since joining the University of Saskatchewan and in the keynote addresses she has given at her field's most important international conferences.

In recognition of her achievements, Dr. Mandryk has won numerous awards and honours, including several best paper awards and honourable mentions. She has twice won the Department of Computer Science's Excellence in Graduate Supervision Award (2012 and 2014). In 2014, she was inducted into the Royal Society of Canada's inaugural College of New Scholars, Artists, and Scientists.

ALEXANDRIA WILSON



Dr. Alexandria Wilson's teaching, research, and outreach engages the public at multiple levels, encompassing and embracing diverse communities and peoples. As associate professor of Educational Foundations in the College of Education, Dr. Wilson undertakes research that is based in community, for community. Although her activities are wide-ranging, they are singular in focus: to improve the lives of Indigenous and marginalized peoples.

Dr. Wilson is the primary architect of the Land-Based Indigenous Education program

linking graduate training with traditional ways of knowing and place-based learning. Students enrolled in the program live on-site within designated Indigenous communities, allowing all people involved immersive and meaningful community building educational experiences. Dr. Wilson instructs teacher candidates and graduate education students to create safe communities for gay, lesbian, bisexual, trans, two-spirited and queer (GLBTQQ) individuals. She has flipped the notion of "coming out" to one of "coming in", recognizing the strong community connections of sexual minorities. Her scholarship on Indigenous perspectives of gender identity is well-respected and widely available internationally.

Dr. Wilson is also a well-known activist for Indigenous rights. She is a founding and inspirational member of the grassroots Idle No More movement that seeks increased recognition of Indigenous rights and the elimination of violence and racist attitudes against Indigenous peoples, nationally and internationally. As part of the Idle No More communications team, Dr. Wilson has helped develop an extensive database of

connected groups and individuals, and using social media, has built a vast network of supporters. Dr. Wilson is also involved with several important educational and outreach efforts drawing attention to missing and murdered Indigenous women in Canada. Dr. Wilson maintains strong connections with her own community, Opaskwayak Cree Nation in western Manitoba, where she has been involved with projects around food sovereignty and community opposition to proposed nuclear-waste disposal. Within Saskatchewan and beyond, Dr. Wilson has conducted cross-cultural awareness training for countless organizations and businesses, bringing her knowledge of Indigenous issues to thousands of people.

Dr. Wilson's scholarship and activism has raised awareness and effected change for Indigenous and queer peoples, enhancing the University of Saskatchewan's reputation as an institution that can understand and serve marginalized people within the province and beyond. Dr. Wilson is a very deserving recipient of the 2015 Award for Distinction in Outreach and Public Service.

HEATHER ANNE BURCH



Heather Burch is graduating from the Indian Teacher Education Program with a bachelor of education degree. Heather already holds a Bachelor of Cognitive Science with a specialization in Linguistics and Applied Language Studies from Carleton University in

Ottawa. Since she has always been interested in the human brain and how the human mind works, it was not a far jump to end up in education. However, it took a trip to the North and a temporary position as a substitute teacher to convince her that teaching would be the right career.

In the fall of 2012, Heather enrolled in the Indian Teacher Education program at Aurora College, a partnership program with the University of Saskatchewan. This program allowed her to stay in Fort Smith, NT, her new home, and still receive the high quality education she would need to be a great teacher. The small class sizes, on the land experience, and cultural content all contributed to her success and will be invaluable in her new career as a Northern teacher.

As a student at Aurora College, Heather had a reputation for consistent academic excellence and for helping her fellow students. During her time as a student, she worked as a tutor at the college, as a research assistant at Aurora Research Institute, and as clerical staff at the South Slave Divisional Education Council (the local school board). She was also involved in the Fort Smith community choir, improv troupe, and as a volunteer at the Fort Smith Animal Shelter.

Unfortunately, Heather is unable to attend convocation today because she is already working in her dream job: teaching! Earlier this fall, she accepted a position at Chief Sunrise Education Centre, a K-12 school near Hay River, NT. She is teaching math and science to students ranging in age from 10 to 26 in a small school and loving every minute of it.
