



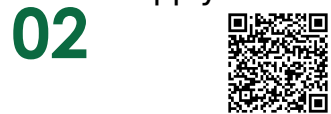
## HOW TO APPLY:

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Netherlands is home to international courts, such as the International Court of Justice and the International Criminal Court.
