#### **FUNDING**

All Canadian (or P.R.) undergraduate students in Arts and Science may be eligible for the Global Skills Opportunity funding. If eligible, students may receive up to \$2000\* toward the program fees. (\*students who have received the GSO previously are not eligible). This project is partially funded by the Government of Canada's Outbound Student Mobility Pilot Program

#### **COST OF PROGRAM: per student**


- USask tuition: approx. <u>~\$717</u> for 3 credit units (students register and pay tuition as usual)
- **Program fee**: ~\$3000
  - **Program fee includes**: accommodations, admission fees, some on-site transportation, some meals.
- Personal expenses: ~\$500 (meals, travel and medical insurance, souvenirs, airport transfers etc.)
- Vaccinations: ~\$400
- Flights\* are included in the Program Fee for: Eligible students. Canadian (or PR), undergraduate Arts and Science students. This program is funded by Global Skills Opportunity, the Government of Canada's outbound mobility pilot program. (\*students who have received the GSO previously are not eligible).

## **PREREQUISITES:**

12 credit units of POLS and/or IS; or 36 credit units at the university level, including at least 6 credit units of ANTH, ENG, HIST, INDG, IS, POLS, RLST, SOC, or WGST.

Students must also have a minimum of 30 cu and an overall average no lower than 65%.





## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This experiential study abroad course explores practical questions of transitional justice using Uganda as a case study. This course critically examines the needs of a community in the aftermath of conflict and explores various approaches to peace-building and justice as attempted in northern Uganda. Uganda has struggled, and continues to struggle, with difficult decisions about how to address legacies of violence and human rights violations.

## **COURSE OVERVIEW**

Recognizing that hearing from the very people who live the struggles and as well as experiencing the locations and environment for oneself has a significant bearing on one's understanding of the challenges to achieving post-conflict positive peace, the course aims to introduce key information and concepts about post-conflict justice and peacebuilding.

The course looks at how questions of justice, history, and politics at the international, national, community levels interact to address legacies of mass violence and histories of violence (like in Canada). The course highlights overlapping considerations in Uganda and Canada despite very different histories of atrocity (such as asking students to really consider what reconciliation between individuals and between groups and governments means, and to explore the relationship between reconciliation/justice and material needs/poverty).
